2023 JUNE AREA DETAILS

Process

- Segments should not be visited more than twice. Problem segments may be visited three times with advance supervisor approval.
- Once state budget reaches 90%, data collection will end.
- When recording mileage in payroll, include a NOTE indicating which segment(s) you were observing
- Pre-survey Packets were mailed to operators from St Louis
 - Example on pages 5-6
 - Old segments (start with [10](#), [12](#), [18](#), [19](#))– all ag and non-ag tracts
 - New Segments (start with [13](#)) – ag tracts
- Tiered data collection
 - The Tier for Ag Tracts is listed:
 - Tier indicator label on the questionnaire
 - Comments in CAPI
 - Tier 2 – data collection starts [May 20](#)
 - Old segment non-ag tracts
 - Selected old segment ag tracts
 - Tier 2 operators were mailed the Pre-survey Packet on [May 12](#)
 - Tier 3 – data collection starts [May 30](#)

Why Participate?

- Provides estimates of the current year's planted acreage.
- Helps farmers make marketing plans.

- Provides population for Objective Yield samples.

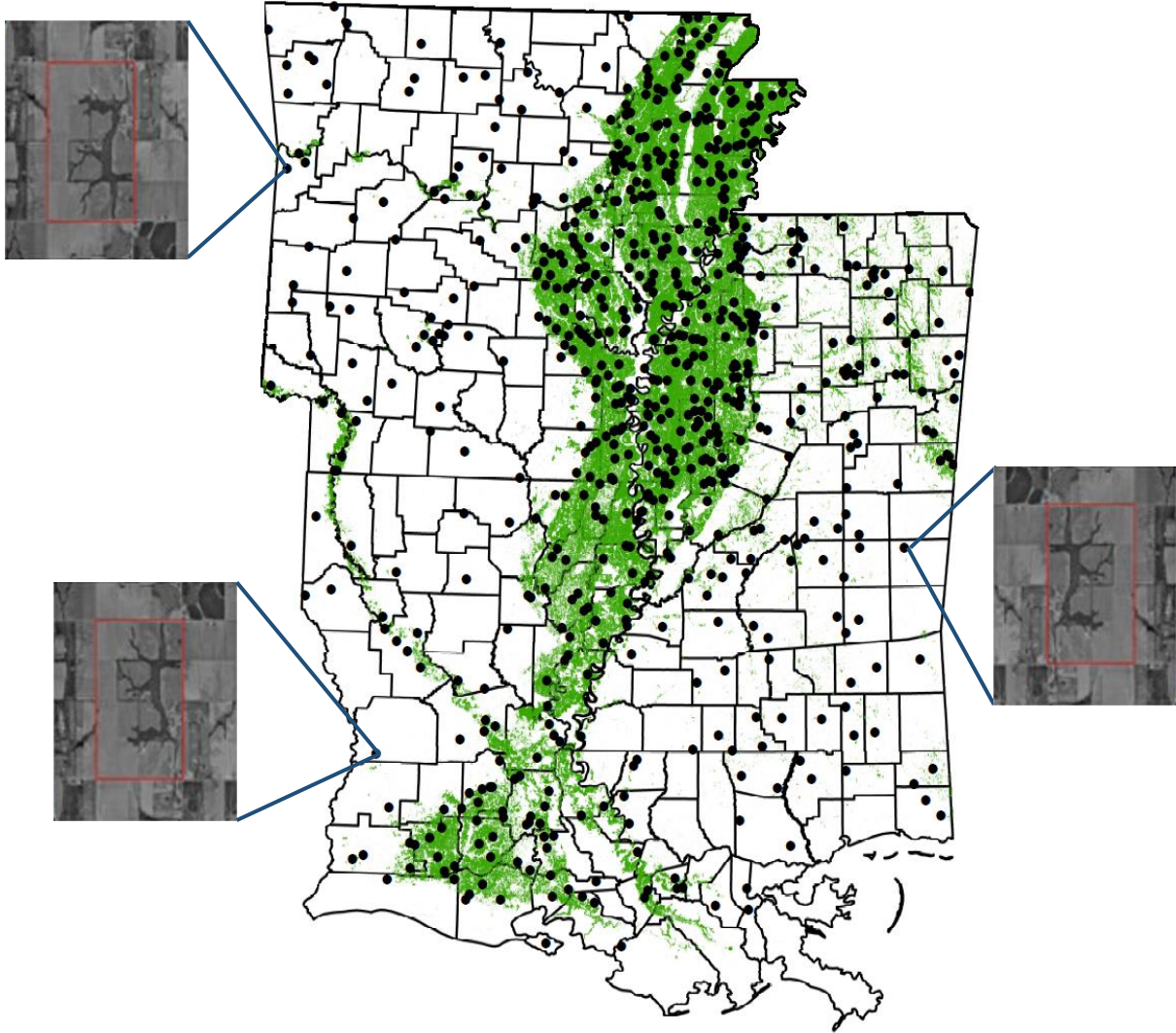
Parcel Map:

Area Segments across the Region:



- Land is stratified based on the amount of cultivated land.
- The dark green areas have a higher density of cultivated land.
- The lighter green areas have a lower density of cultivated land.
- All land in each state is part of the Area Frame – so all land is accounted for.
- There are segments in each strata covering all land types in the state.
- Each dot represents one Area segment.
 - Timber, pasture, urban areas and water are not represented in this graphic.

SAMPLING AND PURPOSE

- **Sampling Frame** – A device from which a sample can be drawn
 - **List Sampling Frame** – a list of units (operators) which constitute the population designated for a sample
 - **Area Sampling Frame** – land area in a state, stratified based on type of land use.
 - **Stratify** – divide a population into similar groups with common characteristics (stratum)
- **Control Data** - A minimal amount of data kept by NASS in order to more accurately stratify and sample operators or segments for surveys
- **Overlap status:** For all cases, follow edit skips for questions on June Area tract questionnaire
 - **Overlap** - Operator is on our list and had the chance to be selected for June Ag (AS) list survey and/or July Cattle (CA) survey.
 - **Non Overlap** - Operator is on our list but did not have the chance to be selected for June Ag (AS) list survey and/or July Cattle (CA) survey.
 - **Not on List** - Operator is not on our List Frame

What is the Area Frame?

- A way of accounting for all the land in the state
 - The target is the land itself which is broken down into segments

How is the Area Frame organized?

- **Stratified by land use**
 - Segments are assigned to a specific strata depending on land use
 - For the Area Frame, we don't use control data, but rather we group regions of land together based on the way it is used.
 - The area frame is created using aerial mapping and other sources to determine the landscape of the area and define the way the land is used.

Who is the target?

- **The land in the segment is the target**
 - Anyone operating land in the segment should be contacted and assigned a tract letter

Strengths

- **Complete** – all locations have chance to be selected
- **Stable** – does not often change
- **Accurate** – good indication for major commodities

Weaknesses

- **Expensive** – must send enumerator to observe every site
- **Timely**
- **Limited** – not a good measure of small acreages or rare commodities

SCREENING AND THE SCREENING FORM

During the screening process, account for all land inside the red segment boundary and determine if the land for each tract operator is considered agricultural or non-agricultural.

- Drive around the segment making observations.
- Use the Half Acre Rule
 - Residential parcels with lot sizes with less than $\frac{1}{2}$ acre and NO visible crop, livestock or storage can be drawn off as one non-ag tract.
 - Residential parcels with visible crop, livestock, or storage must be a separate tract, regardless of size.
 - Contiguous non-residential, non-ag parcels can be a single tract.
- Phone known tract operators to verify if they are still operating land (ag or non-ag) in the segment.

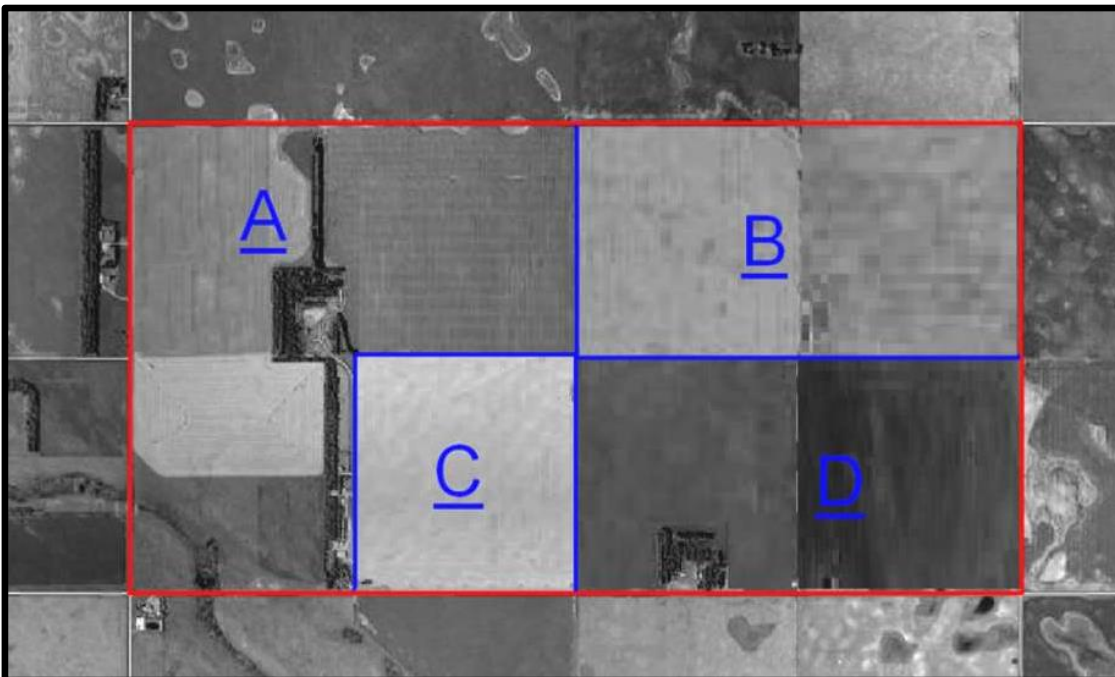
The Screening Form is used to decide when a tract questionnaire is necessary to capture detailed data on crop acreage, livestock inventory, and land values. Make sure to include and account for all land in the operating arrangement.

The Screening Form is a tract directory used to:

- Record the name and address of all tract operators
- Determine if a tract operator qualifies for an Area Tract Questionnaire
- Record name, address, phone and acreage for non-ag tracts

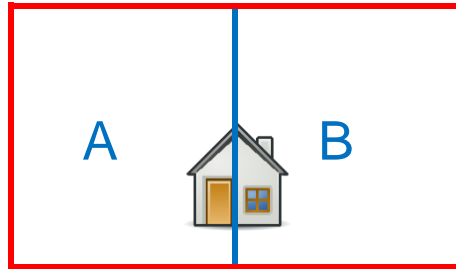
A tract will be classified as:

- Ag – at least 1 screening question is 'Yes' – complete a Tract Questionnaire
- Non-Ag – all screening questions are 'No' – complete Screening Form columns 18, 20, 20a

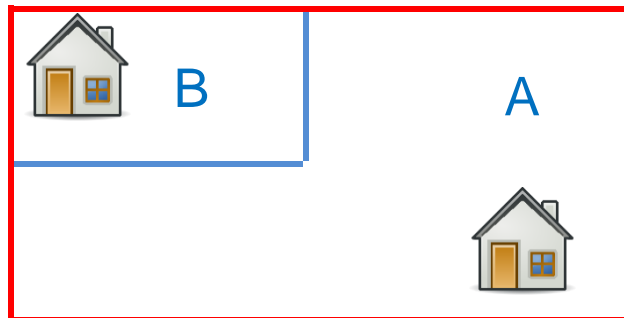


Special Situations (IM page 502)

- 1.) When 2 (or more) farm operators (A & B) live in the same house and both have their OWN agricultural production inside the segment, each operator should be assigned a separate tract letter and be ag tracts.



- 2.) For partnership operations where both the target operator (Tract A) and the partner(s) (Tract B) live inside the segment, complete as an ag tract that includes the target operator's house. Draw off the partner(s) house as a non-ag tract.



Screening Scenarios

- 1) An operator still operates (or lives) in the segment and has not changed ag/non-ag status.
 - a. The operator still operates inside the segment.
 - b. The operator is the same person, so use the **same** tract letter.
 - c. Updates can be made to phone numbers and street address.
 - d. If all screening questions are marked “No”
 - i. The operator is a non-ag tract.
 - ii. Complete columns 18, 20, and 20a.
 - e. If any screening question is a “Yes”
 - i. The operator is an ag tract.
 - ii. Complete the labeled tract questionnaire for the operator.

- 2) An operator that lives in the segment was NON-AG last year and bought 3 horses in April. How do you handle this change?
 - a. The operator still lives in the segment.
 - b. The operator is the same person, so use the **same** tract letter.
 - c. Either the screening question in column 8 is “Yes” or screening questions in columns 8-12 are “No” but column 13 is “Yes.”
 - d. Complete a tract questionnaire. There is not a pre-printed questionnaire since the operator was non-ag last year. Use a blank questionnaire and write the segment, tract, and operator information on the questionnaire.

- 3) An operator was AG last year, but is no longer farming (no crops, no livestock, no CRP). The operator still lives in the segment. How do you handle this change?
 - a. The operator still lives in the segment.
 - b. The operator is the same person, so use the **same** tract letter.
 - c. All screening questions are “No.”
 - d. Complete columns 18, 20, and 20a.
 - e. Strike through the label on the tract questionnaire with a note saying “Non-Ag.” Do **NOT** use the questionnaire for a new operator.
 - f. How do you record the new operator of the land? (If not already in the segment)
 - i. The new operator operates land inside the segment.
 - ii. Use the next unused tract letter
 - iii. Record the name, address, and phone on the screening form.
 - iv. Use the screening form, columns 8-16 to screen the operator for ag activity. They are farming so check “Yes” in Column 8.
 - v. Record the name and address information on the tract questionnaire along with any partners and complete the tract questionnaire.

- 4) An operator was AG last year but sold all cropland (had no livestock or CRP) and moved to a warmer climate. What do you do with this information?
- a. The operator no longer lives or operates land inside the segment.
 - b. Cross off the operator on the screening form with a note "No longer in segment."
 - c. Strike through the label on the tract questionnaire with a note "No longer in segment." Do **NOT** use the questionnaire for a new operator.
 - d. How do you record the new operator of the land? (If not already in the segment)
 - i. The operator operates land inside the segment.
 - ii. Use the next unused tract letter
 - iii. Record the name, address, and phone on the screening form.
 - iv. Use the screening form, columns 8-16 to screen the operator for ag activity. They are farming so check "Yes" in for Column 8.
 - v. Record the name and address information on the tract questionnaire along with any partners and complete the tract questionnaire.

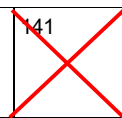

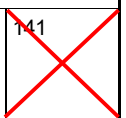
